COMPTON

Fred Compton was the son of **Edward Compton** and **Hannah Schlote**, both New York natives. He was born in November 1897 in Mount Vernon, Westchester County, New York, third of nine children. His parents then moved to Manhattan, New York before settling in the South Bronx, New York.

Fred Compton lived in Baychester only a very short time. In 1924 he gave his voter registration address as **2319 Palmer Avenue**.¹ The houses on that side of the street were demolished for the new entrance into the neighborhood from the extended Bruckner Boulevard. In 1925 he lived at **2108 Bassett Avenue** with his wife **Margaret** (maiden name unknown) and two daughters, **Viola**, age 3, and **Gertrude**, age 2.² Fred supported this family as a shipping clerk. Based on the age of his first daughter, Fred and Margaret probably married circa 1922.

By 1930 Fred Compton and his daughter Violet [Viola] were living with Fred's parents at 198 Brook Avenue in the South Bronx, Mott Haven section; he worked as a helper in the trucking industry.³ His wife Margaret and daughter Gertrude were not found in the 1930 census.

Daughter Viola Compton married Calvin Stanley in Virginia. Daughter Gertrude Compton married Stanley Grataski in Alabama. It is unknown where Fred and Margaret Compton moved to or ended up. No additional information was found on this couple.
