HUBER-DEUTSCH

Joseph and Louisa (Deutsch) Huber owned a house in Baychester in 1930 at 2230 Boller Avenue.¹ They had boarders (who may have been in-laws) living with them in 1930: Mary Deutsch (b. 1890), widow of Leopold Deutsch, and her daughter Mary Deutsch (b.1922). By 1940 the Hubers had moved out. Since Mary Deutsch is a widow, she perhaps had been married to a brother of Louisa. Also of note is the house had another apartment which was rented to Charles and Elizabeth Fischer, Charles (Carl) being the brother-in-law of Josef Huber, known to each other back in Austria².

Joseph Huber was born in Vienna, Austria on January 7 1892³. Josef Huber and Louisa Deutsch married around 1903 in Austria, and they immigrated to America in 1907. They got married when Josef was 31 and Louisa was 33⁴; they had no children. Louisa Deutsch was born in Ruppersdorf, Austria on April 2, 1870, daughter of Austrians Joseph Deutsch and Rosa Lederer.

Joseph and Louisa Huber were New Yorkers their entire lives in America. Joseph supported the family by being a house painter. Prior to moving to Baychester in the Bronx before 1930 they lived in Manhattan. In 1910 they lived in an apartment building near Lincoln Square⁵; in 1920 they lived in an apartment building near the Queens Midtown Tunnel, where Louisa was a rooming house keeper⁶.

Joseph began his application for citizenship in 1912. It was delayed until 1918, with the US Southern District Naturalization Court claiming he was of low intelligence.⁷

Louisa Huber obtained a US Passport in 1920 based on her husband's citizenship so she could visit her parents, **Joseph and Rosa (Lederer) Deutsch**, who remained in Austria.⁸

By 1940 Louisa was living in Queens at 42-12 Rockaway Beach Blvd, where she died on August 18, 1940. She was buried in Saint Michaels Cemetery, East Elmhurst, Queens, New York. 9

Joseph Huber outlived his wife Louisa, but his death and burial are unknown.

No additional information could be found on widow Mary (---) Deutsch or her daughter Mary Deutsch.
